



### **CBC PAC Battleground Poll**

It's a lot more than just the economy for African American voters

A survey of African American voters in battleground districts

Presented by Cornell Belcher, October 2022

### Methodology

These findings are from a proprietary survey conducted by brilliant corners Research & Strategies for CBC PAC.

This is a survey of 703 Black voters in battleground districts with an oversample of 100 sporadic voters. The survey was conducted by phone, using professional interviewers starting on September 23<sup>rd</sup> and ending on September 29<sup>th</sup>, 2022.

The survey's sample was drawn randomly from the voter file and geographically stratified for proportional representation. The data was weighted slightly to adhere to population demographics of voters in the voter file. The margin of error overall is +/- 3.7 percent, with a 95 percent confidence interval. The margin of error for sub-groups will be higher depending on the size of the sub-group sample and the size of the actual response to any given question.




# The majority say that 2022's midterms are much more important than the usual midterm election






# Food and groceries are the biggest inflation concern, with gas prices and housing costs rounding out the top three

When thinking about the ongoing inflation and economic situation, which of these things would you say you're most concerned about or are being affected the most in your life?








How worried are you about the threat of white supremacy and hate crimes to Black people in America today?




## Voters overall see Democrats in Congress as having some, but not a lot, of accomplishments












### An overwhelming majority oppose Roe being overturned across all groups, even more religious voters

Infrequent Churchgoers: 62% strongly oppose 79% total oppose

Rarely/never attend: 73% strongly oppose 80% total support


